Grammar Year 1

In year one, you will need to know how to write sentences properly and how to join them together to make longer pieces of writing.

Words and parts of words

I can add ~s or ~es to nouns to make them plural.



I can add the suffixes ~ing, ~ed, ~egt, ~est to the ends words to change their meanings. helper, helper

I can add the prefix un to the beginning of a word to make it mean the opposite. unkind, or undoing, or untie the boat.

Sentences

I can say a sentence out loud and write it down.

I can join words with the conjunction and in a list.



I can combine two phrases with the word and to a make a longer sentence.

I know that sentences have got nouns and verbs and adjectives in them.

Whole texts



I can join two or more sentences together, in the correct order, to make a longer piece of writing.

Tenses

I can use the correct tense in my speech and am starting to use the correct tenses in my writing.



I can use ~s or ~es at the end of verbs to say what is happening in the present tense to someone else.

He runs, she misses the bus.

Punctuation

I put spaces between words.

I use Capital letters, full stops and question marks to show the beginning and end of sentences.

I use capital letters for names of people and places, the days of the week and for the personal pronoun I.

 - Particular reading skills will be taught (reading keys)




Reading Keys

Reading keys will be used across the school to keep reading comprehension terminology consistent. If you wish to use these as a focus during your reading sessions at home then this would be highly beneficial to your child. Each key focuses on a key skill important to reading development. There are less keys in key stage one and this then develops further into key stage 2.

These can be found in your child's planner.

What if they make a mistake or don't know a word?

- Miss the word out and read to end of the sentence. Then go back to the beginning of the sentence and see if you can work it out.
- Help them to sound word out, model how to do this or talk to them about why this is a difficult word.
- Try to keep the story flowing so you can both enjoy reading together. It is more important for your child to know what the book is about, rather than read every word correctly.
- Remember to be positive and praise your child even if they do not read the whole book fluently.

Extended Code

Children will learn the alternative spellings for each sound.

e.g. ai

They already know the ai sound as in rain, but now they will be introduced to ay as in day and a-e as in make.







Mathematics

S1/1	Count to and across 100, forwards and backwards, beginning with 0 or 1, or from any given number. Count, read and write numbers to 100 in numerals.
S1/2	Count in multiples of twos, fives and tens.
\$1/3	Given a number, identify one more and one less.
\$1/4	Identify and represent numbers using objects and pictorial representations including the number line, and use the language of: equal to, more than, less than (fewer), most, least.
\$1/5	Read and write numbers from 1 to 20 in numerals and words.
S1/6	Read, write and interpret mathematical statements involving addition (+), subtraction (-) and equals (=) signs.
\$1/7	Represent and use number bonds and related subtraction facts within 20.
\$1/8	Add and subtract one-digit and two-digit numbers to 20, including zero.
\$1/9	Solve one-step problems that involve addition and subtraction, using concrete objects and pictorial representations, and missing number problems such as 7 = 9.
\$1/10	Solve one-step problems involving multiplication and division, by calculating the answer using concrete objects, pictorial representations and arrays with the support of the teacher.
S1/11	Recognise, find and name a half as one of two equal parts of an object, shape or quantity.
S1/12	Recognise, find and name a quarter as one of four equal parts of an object, shape or quantity.
\$1/13	Compare, describe & solve practical probs for lengths/heights (long/short/tall, half/double); mass/weight (heavier/lighter); capacity/volume (full/empty, more/less); time (quicker/slower/later).
S1/14	Measure and begin to record the following: lengths/heights; mass/weight; capacity/volume; time (hours, minutes, seconds).
\$1/15	Recognise and know the value of different denominations of coins and notes.
\$1/16	Sequence events in chronological order using language such as: before and after, next, first, today, yesterday, tomorrow, morning, afternoon and evening.
S1/17	Recognise and use language relating to dates, including days of the week, weeks, months and years.
S1/18	Tell the time to the hour and half past the hour and draw the hands on a clock face to show these times.
S1/19	Recognise and name common 2-D shapes (e.g. rectangles, circles and triangles) and 3-D shapes (e.g. cuboids (including cubes), pyramids and spheres).
\$1/20	Describe position, directions and movements, including whole, half, quarter and three-quarter turns.



	Weetho ergo Sosjorol	There are 4 Seasons. The Seasons are Spring, Summer, Autumn, and Winter. The Seasons occur in a cycle.
J-3	AUTUMN	September, October and November
	WINTER	December, January and February
	SPRING	March, April and May
4	SUMMER	June, July and August
AUTUMN FEATURES	W.	Harvest time is in this season. Temperatures drop. Skies can be overcast. Birds migrate to warmer climates. Leaves change colour and fall from deciduous trees.
WINTER FEATURES		The coldest time of year. We sometimes see snow, frost in the morning, sleet, blizzards, and hail. Water freezes to ice. Many plants stop growing. Some animals including hedgehogs and tortoises hibernate.
SPRING FEATURES		In this season temperatures rise and the earth starts to warm up. Flowers begin to grow. This season is associated with rebirth and growth, some baby animals are born (e.g. lambs, chicks)
SUMMER FEATURES		The hottest time of the year. There is usually sunshine, generally dry weather but there may be thunderstorms too! Flowers and trees are in bloom .
Summer solstice	MAIN	The longest day of the year. In the UK it falls on June 21st.
Winter solstice		The shortest day of the year. In the UK it falls on December 21st.
Spring and Autumn Equinox	and the second	There is an equal amount of daylight and night.


